"Bow Bells" Mileposts

There is a series of mileposts on the main London to Eastbourne road with several prominent between Forest Row and East Grinstead (the milepost above is on the A22 just north of Worsted Lane). The cast iron mile markers were put in place by the turnpike trusts in 1754. These have been described as "rebus" or puzzle milestones, a rebus being a picture representing syllables or word, often being a pun. This often held belief is that the distance represents the number of miles from the church of St Mary le Bow in the City. However, an alternative theory, from examination of Ordnance Survey maps, shows the measurements were in fact taken from the "Standard" (an ancient fountain) at Cornhill, considered to mark the centre of London. From the 19th century measurements were taken from a plaque at Charing Cross!
